3. ABSTRACT SUBMISSION

Authors are invited to submit extended (4 pg. maximum) abstracts <u>prior to Sept. 1, 1999</u>. In addition to text, abstracts should include a title with author contact information, and may contain black and white line drawings and/or color graphics, and a reference list. We request authors to submit abstracts electronically as separate attachment files to the following address **ohana@sympatico.ca**.

We have contracted *Ohana Productions*, a digital conference firm, to coordinate the electronic abstract submissions. All text and graphics for the abstract should be submitted as an attachment file to **ohana@sympatico.ca**.

Ohana Productions is also constructing a conference web-page at http://www.soest.hawaii.edu/Coastal_Conf that can be periodically referred to for additional information. Abstracts will be prepared as a digital PDF (portable document format) document. PDF has become the standard for distribution of documents in digital format on the web or via e-mail.

We encourage you to submit your abstract as soon as possible to reserve a place at the conference. We will download the final PDF file and publish it as a Conference Proceedings Volume for distribution when you arrive in Hawaii. Ohana Productions, can deal with text formatted in Word Perfect or Microsoft Word (for both Mac and Windows), but the safest option for sending your abstract is to save text in the "rich text" format. Most word processors allow this option. Graphics should be submitted in CorelDraw, Illustrator, Photoshop, or PhotoPaint format. Both Mac and Windows files are OK. 4. LODGING

We have available 40 studio rooms on-campus at "Lincoln Hall" for \$41/night/room. We also have 25 double occupancy rooms on-campus at "Hale Manoa/Hale Kuahine" \$33/night/room. Below is description of each type of room.

Guests will be charged directly, rent is collected upon arrival at our Front Desk. We accept cash, checks, traveler's checks and Mastercard or Visa.

Please note that Lincoln Hall is an upgraded guest facility. All rooms have private bath, cable TV, double bed and telephone. Maid Service and clean towels are provided Monday through Friday, extra towels are left for guests on Fridays for the weekend. There is no air conditioning in the building. Long distance calls can be made if the guest has a calling card. Besides studios we do have one bedroom with kitchen units @\$61/night/room. A Rollaway/crib can be provided for an additional charge of \$11/roll or crib/night.

Hale Manoa and Hale Kuahine have shared bathroom facilities. There are 2 single beds, a desk, a chair, a telephone and a fan in each room. We provide all linen and bedding, but no towels. A towel packet consisting of a bath towel, wash cloth and a small bar of soap is sold at the Front Desk @\$4.00/packet (price subject to change). Hale Manoa Front Desk is open 24 hours, 7 days a week. Hale Kuahine and Lincoln Hall open at 7:30 a.m. and closes at 9:30 p.m. All transactions are handled at the Hale Manoa Front Desk after the other desks close.

If any guest needs parking, we can send a request form, have them sign and return to our office. I will sign it and fax up to UH Parking. Once approved they will let us know and the guest must go up to pay and pick-up the pass (\$3/day in advance). The Parking Office will assign whatever is available.

NOTE: Interested parties are urged to register for the conference as early as possible.

PRESENTATION FORMAT

The Hawaii Coastal Conference will utilize a somewhat unique formula for research presentations. We hope the following description is helpful in planning the presentation of your research results at the conference.

Each half-day session will begin with keynote speakers who have 45 minutes to speak, followed by 15 minutes for questions. This will be followed with a half-hour "coffee and poster" session for participants to view 24 posters on display for the entire day. The 30 minute poster viewing will be followed by short oral presentations wherein 12 poster authors will each have 10 minutes at the podium. During the oral session, you may use any combination of slides, overhead viewgraphs, or computerized powerpoint displays you wish. It is our hope that authors will speak for ~7 minutes and provide 3 minutes for questions. The goal of the short presentations is to introduce your posters and discuss aspects of particular interest. Each half-day session will have 12 speakers whose posters will be displayed for the entire day. Hence, 24 posters will be on display each day, all day. This arrangement provides authors with both oral and poster venues for presenting research results.

Each author will have a freestanding corkboard on which to mount their posters. The mounting space is $1.2 \text{ m} \times 1.8 \text{ m}$ (4 ft x 6 ft), however your posters may hang all the way to the floor if you wish. Extra space can be easily provided if requested.
