

Welcome aboard! In this course we will explore the immense history of Earth, its rocks, and the living things that have evolved on it. Our voyage is a series of visits to 28 distant and exotic ports of call. At each port we'll travel further back in time and along the branches of the evolutionary Tree of Life as we meet ever more distant relatives of our species, all the way back to the origin of life and Earth. We'll hear about recent human history and culture at each port, but the emphasis will be on the geology and evolution that have shaped our planet and its life over 4.5 billion years.

Textbook: None.

This course is entirely online. You will access the online course materials through Lulima, so you are required to learn how to use it: <https://lulima.hawaii.edu/portal> . Once you login with your UH username/password there is a short Lulima tutorial that is started by clicking on the small figure in the upper right-hand corner of the web page. To enter the course you must click on the tab labeled *GG-101-002* and make selections in the sidebar (e.g. *Syllabus*, *Resources*, *Assessments*). There is a calendar which will contain reminders of due dates! Your computer must also be able to display PDF files (e.g. with Adobe Acrobat) and play MPEG audio files (e.g. with iTunes).

Online lectures: There are **two** lectures assigned each week. Each of the 28 lectures is available as a PDF file containing the slides and an audio file (MPEG) containing the narration. You should open up the PDF, start the audio file in a player, and proceed through the slides as directed by the narration.

Quizzes: There are **two** lectures each week (appearing two at a time on Lulima), and each lecture is accompanied by a 10-question quiz consisting of true/false or multiple-choice questions. The quizzes are "open notes", and there is no time limit for taking the quiz. However, for full credit, each quiz is due by the end of that week 11:59 PM Honolulu time (see the Cruise Plan for due dates). **Quizzes submitted after the deadline, but by the end of the instructional period (May 3) receive half credit.**

Final project: Each student will complete a virtual tour of the geology or biology of a place of particular interest to them. Any place outside of the Hawai'ian islands is permitted, whether you have visited it or not. It's a big world – explore it online! Students can choose to use Google My Maps or Google Earth. Tours will be scored based on (1) science content, (2) technical quality, and (3) creativity. Instructions and guidelines on constructing and sharing the tour, and some do's and don'ts, are in a separate guide. **Virtual tour projects are due on May 3.**

Grading: Grading is not on a curve. The final grade is based on the 28 quizzes, each counting for 2%, and the final project, which counts for 44% of the grade. Letter grades are assigned as follows: 90+% = A, 80+% = B, 70+% = C, 60+% = D. If a final score is within 2% of the next highest letter grade a "+" is added. No other adjustments will be considered. **There is no final exam, and there is no extra credit in this course.**
