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Award-winning publication donated to more than 100 schools statewide

In order to perpetuate greater environmental literacy throughout the State and to celebrate the International Year of the Reef, the University of Hawai'i Sea Grant College Program (UH Sea Grant) has donated over 100 copies of its recently published *Reef and Shore Fishes of the Hawaiian Islands* to secondary school libraries statewide.

Recognizing that there is an urgent need to increase awareness and understanding of coral reefs, 2008 was designated as the International Year of the Reef. By donating copies of *Reef and Shore Fishes of the Hawaiian Islands* to every public and private school throughout the State and through other successful environmental literacy and marine education programs, UH Sea Grant hopes to increase awareness and inspire future generations of marine scientists and professionals.

Reef and Shore Fishes of the Hawaiian Islands, authored by world-renowned ichthyologist Dr. John E. Randall, marks the culmination of 47 years of study. It is regarded as Dr. Randall's finest publication to date. As the recipient of the Ka Palapala Pookela Award of Excellence in the Natural Science category, this comprehensive publication will serve as a vital resource for Hawai'i's school children.
